A GOOD WORD FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5th this year. Lent is a time for us to do some spiritual spring cleaning. The church places before us three spiritual practices to guide our way. They are prayer, fasting and care for the poor (almsgiving).

Prayer is a necessary part of our relationship with the Lord. Like any relationship, communication is necessary. We communicate to the Lord our thoughts, concerns and desires, not because He does not know our hearts better than we do, but because it is good for us to tell Him. Listening is a necessary part of good communication. Without it our prayer life can become a monologue, and we can wonder if anyone is listening! Before saying "Amen" take a few moments to listen. A few moments at first that can grow into 5 minutes or more of silence before the presence of God. The communal prayer of Word and Sacrament is an integral part of our prayer life. God feeds, nourishes and speaks to us in the Eucharist. Plan to come to the Lord's Supper weekly during Lent.

Fasting can be fasting from favorite foods or the quantity of food we consume and can be like a spiritually induced diet. But it is intended to be more than that. Fasting from food can act as a physical reminder that it is Lent. But this reminder should not cause us to focus more on ourselves but lead us more deeply into our relationship with God and neighbor by providing more time for prayer and more money for the care of the poor. The time we save making simple meals could give added time for a scripture reading or another prayer practice. The money we save from preparing simpler meals can be given to the poor. Perhaps the best fast for us is a different type of fast. It may be a fast from certain behaviors or attitudes that are less than edifying in the life of a Christian.

Finally, consider finding ways to give extra offerings for the care of the poor or the outreach ministry of the church. You may do this on your own or you may do this through the ministry of Peace. You might consider giving an extra donation to our local food pantry. You might also consider making a special offering to Lutheran World Relief or Lutheran Disaster Response for the fires out west. You may do so by putting your offering in the plate in worship designating it for one of these charities.

Together—may we have a holy Lent.

LSSI has been criticized in recent media reports. The President of LSSI has issued the following response:

February 3, 2025

Statement on Inflammatory Social Media Posts Regarding Lutheran Service Organizations:

Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI) is aware of inflammatory and misleading statements that were made on social media regarding Lutheran social service organizations nationwide and the work that we do. The statements call into question the bedrock of our collective missions to provide services to our neighbors in need. During our 157-year history, LSSI has partnered with federal and state government to provide critical services for decades.

Federal funding that LSSI receives goes directly toward delivering services, and we are accountable for every dollar received. All of this funding is approved by the Federal government and appropriated by Congress. We follow all regulations of the funding and are subject to federal audit and our own internal auditing. Our more than 1,000 employees are committed to our work and provide our services with excellence and in compliance with all funding guidelines. Additionally, we have a base of committed donors who consistently make charitable contributions to supplement and enhance government funding to continue our programs.

LSSI annually provides social and human services to over 56,000 children, adults, and seniors, including: foster care, mental health services, alcohol and drug treatment, affordable senior housing, home care services for older adults, residential programs for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities, and programs that help people and families impacted by incarceration. LSSI does not receive funding for refugee resettlement or Head Start services, vital programs that appear to be the primary targets for the most recent misleading social media statements.

We realize extreme, even demeaning rhetoric, may continue along with ongoing scrutiny of the funding we, and similar faith-based organizations, receive.

The mission of LSSI is to provide healing, justice, and wholeness to people and communities. Our employees live out this mission every day through the positive impact of their work. LSSI holds firm to our mission and faithfully provides critical services that bring dignity, health and well-being, and the promise of reaching one's full potential to our clients.
